This program is designed specifically for UT-Dallas offering a one-month program for pre-med students in the Summer of 2018. The program offers the opportunity for program participants to further enhance their preparation for a career in health care, while immersing themselves in a 6-credit one month intensive Medical Spanish and Internship Course in Seville, Spain. Students will live with host families, participate in a variety of weekly activities, visit the historic cities of Córdoba and Granada, receive medical Spanish training, EMT pre-hospitalization training and perform an internship in a hospital environment shadows doctors of various disciplines.

No previous knowledge of Spanish is required for this program.



Students interested in pursing a career in medicine can now complement their university education through UTD's Summer Spanish Language and Medical Internship programs. GlobalEd's experience, staff, infrastructure and relationship with the health care sector in Seville, Spain offer an unparalleled study abroad opportunity. The development of programs likes these comes from years of networking with local hospitals and professionals in the healthcare sector. Program participants will shadow doctors from a wide range of disciplines and nurses in a hospital environment and/or with private practices performing as much as 20 hours of work per week while receiving intensive Spanish Language training.















GlobalEd also includes Emergency Medical Training (EMT) through a 4-day intensive training course. EMT is a hands-on experience for aspiring health professionals designed to provide program participants in-depth training in emergency protocols/disaster relief/pre-hospitalization services to secure the zone of an accident, stabilize victims and prepare them for transportation to hospitals.

Excursions



Visit the Roman Ruins of Itálica, Rome's first city built in the Iberian Peninsula in the second century B.C. Student will learn about daily life in the 2nd Century B.C., the advanced technology and architecture of the Roman civilization and the contributions of the Roman empire which can still be seen in today's cities.

Spend a day in Cordoba and explore its treasures starting with the Alcazar de los Reyes Cristianos. Walk through and enjoy the beauty of Córdoba's famous Mezquita, spectacular testimony to the Califalian age. Explore the Jewish quarter, full of life and great shops. Walk through Córdoba's streets including the "Callejón de las Flores" and "Plaza de los Gran Maimonides", stopping off at the Sinagogue.



Spend the weekend in **Granada**, an evoking city where multiple civilizations that once lived on Andalusia soil left a cultural legacy that is a marvel of the world. The Alhambra is the joy that crowns this beautiful city at the foot of the Sierra Nevada mountain range.



Housing

This is a four day hands-on training camp designed to provide program participants an in-depth looking into the world of prehospitalization services.

Students will participate in a 4-day program 9 hours per day to learn a wide range of services and scenarios simulating the work of actual EMTs.

4 Day - Pre-hospital EMT Training Camp Summary

Overview

This four-day course is aimed at medical and nursing students. The course is primarily an examination, focusing on using a range of equipment in a variety of trauma scenarios. PECM teaches the student to identify and act quickly in the emergency management of the trauma victim(s). This program is endorsed by SAMU. It includes PHTLS, ITLS and GIAT standards as core course.

Contents

The course will include theory lessons and practice sessions, including:

Prehospital services in Spain and other European countries.

- Prehospital Decalogue (Protocol).
- Traffic Accident Comprehensive Management
- Scene Assessment: Scouting and Zoning
- Index Command System
- Scene Management
- Basic Trauma Life Support
- Kinematics of trauma
- Equipment and material resources in the prehospital scenario
- Patient initial assessment and management
- Advanced Trauma Life Support
- Immobilization and Mobilization
- Specific Traumatic Injuries (Head, thorax, spinal, etc.)
- Environmental Injuries (Heat, cold, lightning, drowning, etc.)
- AMV (Accident with Multiple Victims) Assistance
- Lifesaving maneuvers
- Triage
- Grouping
- Evacuation



Learning Outcomes

After the student has completed the course, he/she will be able to:

- Describe the EMS activation protocol.
- Identify dangerous scenarios, potential hazards and minimum safety standards.
- Recognize hierarchy within pre-hospitalization services providers.
- Provide an understanding of the need for a rapid assessment of the trauma patient.
- Manage the prehospital care of the multi-system trauma patient.
- Perform extraction, immobilization and mobilization maneuvers that will ensure victim's safety.

Time, Location & Resources

The course will take place at SAMU *Escuela de Emergencias* at Gelves, Seville during May-July of 2016, along 4 days from 09:00h through 21:00h with a two-hour break for lunch. It requires a minimum of 80% of attendance, for a total of 40 contact hours, in order to successfully pass the course.

Program participants will be provided with reading material such as PHTLS 8th ed. and ATLS 9th ed., but this is not compulsory. All teaching material will be sponsored by SAMU, including personal protective equipment, except for working gloves.

All program participants will be asked to wear long-sleeved shirts, long pants and close-toed shoes, and to bring an extra change of clothes every day, as they may get wet or dirty.

Assessment

Participation and attitudinal qualities as implemented during the practice, will be the only aspects considered to successfully receive a certificate of attendance/participation for the course. Students will have to pass a test in order to get fully accredited for the course.

Methodology

SAMU Teaching Unit employs an eminently active and participative methodology. The instructor's role focuses on promoting student learning, acting as counselor, planner and facilitator. Theoretical and practical aspects will be explored together, so that learning is constructive, meaningful and functional. Practices will focus on the "knowledge", "know-how" and "how to be". Those will be taught gradually, ensuring that students enjoy their daily activity, mastering the knowledge and skills learned, making the work pleasurable.

We promote a proactive attitude of students, throughout our workshops and simulations which will be of increasing complexity. This program is designed to simulate real life scenarios, hence, active participation will be encouraged, and is considered an essential in order to achieve the desired learning outcomes.
